21.146 New Harvest Time Soup Kitchen

N\$15,000.00

<i>Results:</i>	New Harvest Time for Christ Mission Church is a community church in Klein Aub. After realising the situation regarding hunger and neglect amongst the children, disabled and elderly members of the community, the church started a soup kitchen. The soup kitchen provides a nutritious meal twice a week and also offers some psychosocial support to those coming to the soup kitchen.
<i>Funds (to be) used for:</i>	<u>N\$15,000.00 from Sundry Donations (July'22 – December'22):</u> Funding will be used for: Monthly grocery purchases for the soup kitchen
<i>Grading organization:</i>	B
<i>Monitoring by ID:</i>	Narrative and financial reports are due 15 October 2022 and 15 January 2022.
<i>Remarks:</i>	Project is very effective in the community and well managed.

22.003 Pantry Project (SPENS)

N\$278,000.00

<i>Results:</i>	The SPENS Project started in 2002. The rationale behind the project was to live out in a practical way the vision of NG Eros – “We care” and “Christ All, In All.” The goal is to create a permanent virtual pantry, for those in need of food and other material items, by being a collection point for all essential products and funds by donors. The collected contents should then be dispersed to people previously identified as truly needy. Before receiving any assistance the people should fill in a form with all of their details that is stored. SPENS project reached out to people from within the NG Eros congregation and outside the congregation. Apart from providing assistance to individual people, SPENS also distributes food parcels to community soup kitchen projects. It is this area which is funded through Imago Dei. On a monthly basis the following projects are supported by SPENS: - 4 soup kitchens for OVC (Acacia Children Trust, Havana Soup Kitchen, Lambs Pasture, Prayer House of God Ministries, and Saved to Serve Ministries) - 1 feeding program for elderly (Namibian Christian Women Aid Society) - 1 individual food parcel project run from the premises of the NG Eros Church
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	The projects receive a standard quantity of various sorts of food, like pasta, cooking oil, soup mix, maize meal, sugar, and soya mince. Project managers/staff collect the food from the members of SPENS at the NG Eros Church premises. Members of the SPENS team must visit their assigned projects and fill out evaluation forms of the projects under their care once a term.
<i>Funds (to be) used for:</i>	<u>N\$40,000.00 from GZB and N\$238,000.00 from NG Eros (September'22 – August'23)</u> Funding is to be used for purchasing of food items.
<i>Grading organization:</i>	BB
<i>Monitoring by ID:</i>	Narrative and financial reports are due in March 2023 and September 2023. Monitoring visit was done in September 2022 through attending the food distribution event and the committee meeting.
<i>Remark:</i>	The project is well organized and currently under the leadership of Ms Elaine Pienaar. The project has also taken great initiative in raising funds to compliment the funding which they receive through Imago Dei.

22.104.1 The Grace Project - Medical Outreach**N\$43,200.00**

<i>Results:</i>	The Grace Project is a non-profit, community-based project which reaches out to the marginalized people in different communities throughout the Khomas and Kharas regions by contributing towards their basic livelihood, as well as attending to their psychosocial needs. In 2018 the project identified the need of sufficient medical services in rural areas like Groot Aub, Schlip, Rietoog (Hentiesbay) and even Khorixas. They started with a medical outreach where they invite doctors, nurses, psychologist, dentists and optometrists to spend a weekend in the identified community and offer services to the patients. The outreaches have been very successful thus far. In 2019 they had an outreach in Schlip and to Hentiesbay. With COVID-19 the outreaches were not possible during 2020 and 2021. This year from 12 to 14 August they went to Aranos.
<i>Funds (to be) used for:</i>	<u>N\$43,200.00 from GZB (May'22 – October'22)</u> Funds are to be solely used for expenses related to the Aranos medical outreach of 12-14 August 2022.
<i>Grading organization:</i>	BB
<i>Monitoring by ID:</i>	Narrative reports and financial reports were submitted in September 2022.
<i>Remark:</i>	Discussion between Imago Dei and GZB (Linda Stuut) for volunteers from the Netherlands to travel to Namibia to assist with the medical outreaches and to volunteer for at least 2 weeks at other projects of Imago Dei is still ongoing. The project handed in all reports from the previous funding. Project is well organized and managed by Riana Maasdorp, the project coordinator.

22.126 Sofia's Soup Kitchen and Day Care

N\$112,030.00

<i>Results:</i>	Miss Sofia Garises started the soup kitchen in 2013 from her home with ca. 27 children on a Saturday. Miss Sofia is unemployed herself, with the small food donations and temporary work she was able to purchase some food to cook for the children on a Saturday. However, this number has now grown to ca. 150 children per week. Miss Garises reports that with the assistance of her daughters they want to establish a community support centre at their home, where the community can obtain some psycho-social support, children can attend a daily soup kitchen, kindergarten, an afterschool centre, youth activities, as well as bible study sessions. Since starting with this project Miss Garises has set up a kindergarten and provides afterschool care for school learners. Between 2020 and 2021 this project has grown and some of the plans that they had for the project have come to fruition. They have been able to separate the kindergarten class area from the after school area and now have a new kitchen area. They also have set up a garden which is doing very well.
<i>Funds (to be) used for:</i>	<u>N\$112,030.00 from Verburg Foundation (August'22 – July'23)</u> Funds are to be used for: • Purchasing of food for the soup kitchen • Purchasing gas bottle refills (2 x 9kg and 2 x 48kg) • Providing core funding for project to continue with activities, including project leader and teacher stipends.
<i>Grading organization:</i>	B
<i>Monitoring by ID:</i>	Narrative and financial reports are due in February 2023 and July 2023. Monitoring visit to be done in January 2023.
<i>Remark:</i>	All funding for this project was received from the Verburg Foundation.

22.150 Burgershoek Children's Community Project

N\$22,000.00

<i>Results:</i>	Burgershoek Children Community Project was established during June 2021 to address the need of children in the area. Burgershoek is an informal settlement in Block G in Rehoboth. This project is operating on a holistic basis and aims to provide psychosocial support to 140 children in the area initially, however, the project aims to eventually reach 700 children and their parents over a period of three years. They wish to focus on all the needs of children including their physical needs, emotional needs, spiritual needs, mental health needs, educational needs and social needs.
<i>Funds (to be) used for:</i>	<u>N\$ 22,000.00 from NG Eros (July'22 – December'22)</u> Funds are to be used for: • Purchasing of food for the soup kitchen • Purchasing of a 48kg gas bottle and 3 refills
<i>Grading organization:</i>	BB
<i>Monitoring by ID:</i>	Narrative and financial reports are due in October 2022 and January 2023. Monitoring visit to be done in November 2022.

<i>Remark:</i>	This project is a much-needed initiative in the Burgershoek area, and, although it is still very new, it is clear that those running the project is serious about making it a successful and lasting project. With the board members they have good administrative and managing capabilities, and finances are effectively controlled.
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22.154 Eastern Court**N\$60,000.00**

<i>Results:</i>	Eastern Court is a government managed old age home situated in Klein Windhoek. There are 20 housing units at the old age home and a total of 24 elderly persons living there. Everyone living at this home is still able to take care of themselves physically. The residents pay a small monthly fee to live there and have pre-paid electricity which they must manage themselves. As with most elderly persons, the residents of Eastern Court all struggle to get by on their monthly government pensions and welcome any in kind donations.
<i>Funds (to be) used for:</i>	<u>N\$60,000.00 from NG Eros (August'22 – July'23)</u> Funds are to be used for: Purchasing food items for food parcels
<i>Grading organization:</i>	B

<i>Remark:</i>	This project also receives a donation of vegetables every month.

22.156 URC Mariental Soup Kitchen**N\$30,000.00**

<i>Results:</i>	URC Mariental Soup Kitchen was started in April 2022 after the members of the URC realised that a change was needed in the community to reduce the hunger suffered by families in the Empelheim settlement in Mariental. The project decided to provide a warm meal twice a week to families. At the moment they serve the meals every Wednesday and Friday afternoon to ca. 350 people.
<i>Funds (to be) used for:</i>	<u>N\$ 30,000.00 from NG Eros (September'22 – February'23)</u> Funds are to be used for: Purchasing of food for the soup kitchen
<i>Grading organization:</i>	B

21.020 DEGNOS

N\$237,838.00

<i>Results:</i>	Diens en Getuienis Noordooste Streek (DEGNOS) is a missional organization that aims to improve the lives and spiritual wellbeing of primarily the SAN communities in the north-eastern region of Namibia. In its community upliftment program DEGNOS focuses not solely, but primarily on the San/Bushman people who live in severe poverty. They believe that the most effective vehicle for poverty eradication is education, specifically early childhood development (ECD). This gives the child a head start in completing school and thereby improving the probability to find full time employment and thereby improving quality of life. They have therefore established an early childhood development program for the community. DEGNOS utilizes a two-pronged approach to achieve the desired outcome with its early childhood development program. The first prong is developing ECD centres and practitioners (Teachers) out of the community for the community. DEGNOS hopes to achieve this by introducing children at a young age i.e. 3-6 years of age, to pre-primary school preparation in their mother tongue. The second prong is the school nutrition programme. DEGNOS has endeavored to provide one meal per day to every child that attends DEGNOS pre-schools, thereby trying to address the problem of malnutrition and giving the children the best possible opportunity to complete school. Since January 2017 DEGNOS is acting as a conduit for 15 schools in the following areas: • Seven Schools in the Tsumkwe West area, (Mangetti Duin ECD Centre, Kandou ECD Centre, Aasvoëlne ECD Centre, Mkata ECD Centre, Omatako ECD Centre, Kanovlei ECD Centre, and Grashoek ECD Centre) • One School at farm Henta (Henta ECD Centre) • Three Schools in the Kavango East Region (Omega ECD Centre, Rundjara ECD Centre, and Mupapama ECD Centre) • Two Schools in the Tsintsabis area, (Oerwoud ECD Centre and Tsintsabis ECD Centre) • One School at Omatope in the Oshikoto region (Omatope ECD Centre) • One School in the and Western - Zambezi area (Cheto ECD Centre)
<i>Funds (to be) used for:</i>	N\$237,838.00 from Verburg Foundation (April'22 – March'23): Funds are to be distributed equally between 13 community ECD centres.

21.045.1 Child Evangelism Fellowship**N\$21,000.00**

<i>Results:</i>	The aim of Child Evangelism Fellowship is to have a Good News Club (GNC) in every town, every street and on every farm. GNC is a neighbourhood-based, bible-centred club for children aged 4-14. They also train teachers, volunteers and teenagers from the community to be able to carry out these sessions. CEF Namibia would like to send a new volunteer to South Africa to receive CEF training in order to become a full-fledged CEF field worker.
<i>Funds (to be) used for:</i>	<u>N\$21,000.00 from Hope Through Grace Trust (July'22 – December'22):</u> Funds are to be used for: • Training costs of one student to receive CEF training in South Africa
<i>Grading organization:</i>	BB
<i>Monitoring by ID:</i>	First narrative and financial reports are due in September 2022, and the second narrative and financial reports are due in March 2023.
<i>Remark:</i>	Since the end of 2021 the administrative aspects of this project was taken over by Trudie van Niekerk who operates out of Tsumeb. This has greatly improved the reporting and operational aspects of the project.

22.058 Women at Work**N\$26,500.00**

<i>Results:</i>	The Women at Work Training Centre is a non-profit association incorporated under Section 21 of the company's act. The centre was established in 2009 by Riana Brandt and has trained over a thousand women since then. Women at Work Training Centre offers a variety of training courses including needlework/dressmaking, hospitality, and Au Pair courses. All courses offer a section on basic life skills, in order for students to become self-sufficient, and students who complete the courses receive a certificate. After completion of courses Women at Work provides students with the prospect of finding safe and well-guided service opportunities, through an efficiently run employment bureau.
<i>Funds (to be) used for:</i>	<u>N\$ 20,000.00 from NG Eros (September'22 – December'22)</u> Funds are to be used for Hospitality Course in November 2022 - Direct costs of the training, groceries, cleaning material, consumables and maintenance, protective clothing, as well as one month's fee for the trainer.
<i>Grading organization:</i>	A
<i>Monitoring by ID:</i>	Narrative and financial reports were submitted in January 2022. Monitoring visit to be done during one of the training sessions in November.
<i>Remark:</i>	Overall this project is very well managed.

22.143 Trauma and Recovery Centre**N\$11,520.00**

<i>Results:</i>	Trauma and Recovery Centre was established in September 2018 by a retired social worker experienced in Mental Health issues, Ms Hartung. Ms Hartung worked for the Ministry of Health and Social Services (MoHSS) in Keetmanshoop and has experienced that mental health issues like Post Traumatic Stress Disorders (PTSD) and depression do not get effective therapy services from service providers due to capacity problems. Many trauma survivors experience PTSD because they cannot cope with their trauma and therefore struggling coping with life after the trauma. Ms Hartung offers counselling to people with various mental health issues. Her services also cover doing counselling home visits and counselling at schools when requested by social workers from the Ministry of Health and Social Services and Ministry of Gender Equality and Child Welfare, or the police. Several people struggling with alcohol and drug problems are also referred to her and she prepares such clients for rehabilitation and after care support. In the absence of psychological and psychiatric services in the regions where she operates, most people can only access the services through her program.
<i>Funds (to be) used for:</i>	<u>N\$ 11,520.00 from Hope Through Grace Trust (July'22 – December'22)</u> Funds to be used for the payment of 5 women to complete training courses through Women's Action for Development (WAD).
<i>Grading organization:</i>	B
<i>Monitoring by ID:</i>	Narrative and financial reports are due in January 2023.
<i>Remark:</i>	None

22.152 Protective Behaviours Programme**N\$135,550.00**

<i>Results:</i>	The Protective Behaviours Programme is an excellent training for the prevention of child abuse and protection. The programme teaches children, young people and adults skills and strategies to help prevent and reduce child abuse and violence in the community. Whilst preventing child abuse appears an overwhelming undertaking, the Protective Behaviours Programme provides a framework that can easily be adapted to home, school and community environments. In order to work towards preventing children becoming victims of abuse, particularly sexual abuse, it is important to educate children on their right to personal safety.
<i>Funds (to be) used for:</i>	<u>N\$135,550.00 from Capricorn Foundation (September'22 – August'23)</u> Funds are to be used for: • Training of 15 community volunteers on the programme • Implementation of the programme amongst the children of Burgershoek • Graduation of the children • Evaluation and planning
<i>Grading organization:</i>	BB

<i>Monitoring by ID:</i>	Narrative and financial reports are due in March 2023 and September 2023. Monitoring visit to be done in during the training sessions.
<i>Remark:</i>	The people residing in Burgershoek are living under compromising, difficult circumstances, and form part of the neediest ones in Rehoboth. This programme is therefore much needed for the children residing in the area to improve their lives and ensure that they can live up to their potential.



Emergency Intervention

22.136 Response Action Based Organisation

N\$350,000.00

<i>Results:</i>	This organisation was established by Mr Itodo and responds to calls about any kind of violence, neglect, abuse and conflict in all areas of Windhoek. Mr Itodo goes out to reported cases to assess what kind of intervention is needed. Those in need of immediate assistance are transported to the appropriate service such as a hospital or shelter. Some cases are dealt with at the Community Affairs Division room at Wanaheda Police Station. The organisation also does a lot of community awareness around social issues and empowerment of victims of abuse and violence.
<i>Funds (to be) used for:</i>	<u>N\$350,000.00 from Capricorn Foundation (May'22 – April'23)</u> Funds are to be used for: • Purchasing of a JAC T6 1.9 TDi (Double Cab 4x2) bakkie • Purchasing of a Rhino Cab Aluminium Canopy • Installation of a vehicle tracking device on the vehicle
<i>Grading organization:</i>	BB
<i>Monitoring by ID:</i>	First Narrative and Financial Reports were submitted in September 2022 and the second narrative and financial reports are due May 2023. Vehicle inspection is done monthly.
<i>Remark:</i>	Project is very effective in the community. Mr Itodo has a great passion for the work that he does. Through the project's WhatsApp group the daily work of the project can clearly be monitored and the networking with government institutions is clearly visible.

22.151 Hope for Life Foundation

<i>Results:</i>	Hope for Life Foundation is a Christian, non-denominational, non-profit institution providing a variety of services. The foundation has a company registration number, 2018/2969, and is a registered Welfare Organisation with the Ministry of Health (WO 481). The current primary focus is on providing counselling, support and training to women and men facing unplanned pregnancies in Namibia. The centre also provides economic upliftment opportunities for women through small Business Starter Packs and mentoring.
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<i>Funds (to be) used for:</i>	<u>N\$69,450.00 from Capricorn (September'22 – February'23)</u> Funds are to be used for: • Payment of the salary for a half-day social worker for a period of 6 months
<i>Grading organization:</i>	A
<i>Monitoring by ID:</i>	Narrative and financial reports are due in December 2022 and March 2023. Monitoring visit to be done in January 2023.
<i>Remark:</i>	This project is very well managed and makes a huge impact in the community. They are in the process of building a safe haven for children who are removed from their homes or awaiting adoption.

21.054 Saved to Serve Ministries – feeding program**N\$31,463.00**

<i>Results:</i>	Saved to Serve Ministries was started by Pastor Pierre Paul Mutombo, a missionary from the DRC, who wanted to see change in the lives of the children in the Havana settlement in Windhoek. His approach has two parts. Firstly, he organizes gatherings for children, aged 5-14 years, where they learn from the Bible, sing songs, play games etc. - using the CEF program. Secondly, he ensures that when they come, they receive a warm, nutritious meal. Unfortunately due to COVID-19 the gatherings had to be stopped in 2020 for a period of time and could only resume partially as from late 2021. He currently runs the programme on a Tuesday and Thursday. At the start of the project a number of ca. 180 children used to turn up, however, in the past few months this number has ballooned to 280 to 320.

<i>Monitoring by ID:</i>	First narrative and financial reports were submitted in April 2022, and the second narrative and financial reports are due in October 2022. Monitoring visit was done in March 2022.
<i>Remark:</i>	The project is very well managed and regularly submits their documentation and reports.

21.055 Namibian Christian Women Aid Society**N\$60,000.00**

<i>Results:</i>	Namibia Christian Women Aid Society is a Welfare Organisation established in 1976 (WO5) with the aim of caring for the elderly. All members work on a voluntary basis. They aim to provide 450 pensioners with food parcels monthly. They also visit these pensioners at their homes to provide psycho-social support. NCWAS received a Quantum minibus as a donation from Imago Dei and GZB in 2017. The women use this minibus to distribute their monthly food parcels which contains basic dry food items. Every food parcel is delivered at the beneficiaries' homes. Once a month they have an inter-church gathering where the elderly receives a light meal.
<i>Funds (to be) used for:</i>	<u>N\$ 60,000.00 from Capricorn (October'21 – September'22)</u> Funds are to be used for purchasing food supplies for monthly food parcel distribution.
<i>Grading organization:</i>	BB
<i>Monitoring by ID:</i>	First narrative and financial reports were submitted in April 2022, and the second narrative and financial reports are due in October 2022. Monitoring visit was done in January 2022.
<i>Remark:</i>	Project is well organized and managed. Project also receives food from SPENS project.

21.104 The Grace Project**N\$36,000.00**

<i>Results:</i>	The Grace Project is a non-profit, community-based project which reaches out to the marginalized people in different communities throughout the Khomas and Karas regions by contributing towards their basic livelihood, as well as attending to their psycho-social needs. The project also strives to provide basic necessities such as food, clothes, blankets, etc. while also providing social welfare services such as counselling and referrals to needy individuals.
